Quantum landmark capped by big wins

fibreglass manufacturing firm in the heart of the Black Country has been celebrating reaching its quarter century with a string of high-profile con-

Work for some of the biggest names in entertainment and automotive engineering has helped see Quantum Mouldings through one of the roughest patches for UK industry since the last war.

Run by brothers Peter and Mark Wooldridge, it has maintained its turnover at around £1.5 million,

despite the turbulence of the last two years.

Peter said: "Our emphasis has been on quality and customer service, and we believe that is what has seen us through. We have kept customers - some have been with us 10-15 years – although many have cut back on their orders during the recession. But we have made up for that by winning business from new clients."
At its 20,000 sq ft manufacturing site in Wollaston,

Quantum makes fibreglass components for a wide range of customers: "We can do anything, and gen-erally have over the years," said Peter.

It sometimes takes an effort to keep focused on the areas we want to concentrate on – there's a huge range of work out there that we could handle if we

Injection

The current workload includes what the brothers believes is the biggest single piece of fibreglass moulding currently made in the UK from matched tooling – a six metre long trailer cover used to carry high-performance cars that is made in a single injection shot. Used to ferry cars on track days, the popularity of the trailer and its smaller sister have

resulted in hundreds of orders for Quantum.

The 25-strong team at the Quantum Works, in Enville Street, also make air cleaner housings for the Ford V6 engines fitted to roadsters, body panels for telehandlers and the new Modec range of electric vehicles – made in Coventry – as well as pick-up truck

canopies for Truckman.

This year has seen diversification for Quantum ment attractions. The London Eye work is part of a rolling programme that has seen Quantum supply inner and outer panels for most of the capsule that isn't glass,

from bearing covers to the roof and underbelly.

Quantum have also played a large part in the supply of GRP parts for this year's extension to Euope's largest themed attraction near Paris.
For Peter and Mark the constant demand for their

work has confirmed the rightness of their decision, back in 2001, to sell off the kit-car arm that kicked off the business back in the 1980s.

"We started out almost by accident," said Mark, now 50 and the company's finance director. "Our younger brother Harvey and I bought a kit car that didn't go together and we thought we could do bet-

Since then, Harvey has "retired" to Spain – he is still only 47 – while Mark and Peter, as managing director, have continued to build the business with the help of general manager Steve Galbraith, office manager Alison Rowbottom and the rest of the Quantum

"We have worked very hard to be as efficient as we can, to give customers the best quality and service," said Peter, now 44. "It is the only way to keep customers in the long term, and to win new ones. And we are still coming up with new products to offer them, such as 'flocking'."

This involves spraying 2mm lengths of nylon on to fibreglass, leaving a soft, fuzzy and waterproof covering. "We are using it to line the inside of body shells, but we are still looking into all the other uses it could have.

Although the brothers no longer make cars, they still have a toe in the water: making parts for one of
